Cobden Playgroup's aim is to provide a safe and supportive environment for participants to build friendships and social supports, and to allow children to learn and develop through play.

Equally important is the opportunity it gives parents to exchange ideas and parenting experiences!

The Playgroup offers many inside and outside activities suitable for preschoolers, such as painting, craft activities, working with play dough, plus a large sandpit, a trampoline and cubby house.

The organisation was established approximately 30 years ago by a group of mothers who were looking for activities for their pre-school children.

Last year there were about 50 families involved with Playgroup.

It is open to all families with children aged five and under. There is also a discount for those families with a health care or pension card.

Playgroup meets every Tuesday and Thursday mornings at 10am behind Cobden Health Services. It is sign-posted out the front.

Landcare in Action Elingamite-Cobrico Landcare Group

The group was formed in 1991 on the suggestion of Nabil Badawy, a soil scientist from Warrnambool. Nabil had identified salinity as the cause of low productivity on an area of the van de Wouw property at Elingamite North.

Meetings at the angling club rooms at Lake Elingamite began an education process whereby members learned to recognise salinity signs and explored ways to combat it.

Piezometers (water table bores) were installed in 1991 and are still being read monthly by group member Ken Farquharson, with the figures being sent to a data base in Bendigo. Members were also very keen to establish native trees, so we learned how to collect

and propagate seed by both direct seeding and tube establishment. Three members completed tree growing courses. At our six-weekly meetings we listened to speakers on many subjects from foxes to underground water to travelling in Chile.

The group adopted an ibis design for its logo before the Corangamite Shire also chose an ibis logo.

A plan was initially developed to create a wildlife corridor from Lake Elingamite to Lake Cobrico. This was later extended to become the Rail Trail to Mt Emu Creek Link. Many thousands of trees have been established although there are still some gaps which should be filled.

We have been given enormous support over the years by the Heytesbury and Corangamite Shires, the Corangamite and Glenelg-Hopkins CMAs, whose borders our area straddles, the Department of Agriculture, Greening Australia, Parks Victoria, the Heytesbury District Landcare Network, gas companies, scout and school groups.

After fifteen years, the group's achievements were celebrated in 1996, with a district tour. a dinner, planting a commemorative tree at Lake Elingamite by Cr Geoff Smith and 2000 trees on the Cobden-Warrnambool Road at Elingamite. In July last year a dinner was held to celebrate the twenty year milestone.

Our original aims have been achieved to a large degree, and meetings are now only held about three times a year, with attendance still consistently twelve to fifteen people. In recent years the focus has been more on roadside blackberry and pampas grass control. Current office-bearers are: president, Jeff Wakeling, secretary/treasurer, Barbara Cowley. Anyone is welcome to join at \$10 per property per year, with membership being necessary for access to grant assistance. Nola Farquharson

Andrew from the newsagency generously gave me a huge pile of newspapers when I ran out of paper to start the wood heater (thank goodness we have gas-ducted heating now).


Our back neighbours shared the overflow from their veggie garden. There's nothing like fresh veggies we discovered.

Around the circuit with the Kart Club

The South West Kart Club is based at the old Cobden Racecourse and was formed in August 1992 by local members who previously had raced at Geelong and Ballarat.

At this first meeting a decision was made to build a first class bitumen track specifically for go kart racing and so a plan was drawn up with the track being 966 metres in length and eight metres in width.

After a lot of hard work from members and the local community who got right behind the project from the start, the track was finally ready for racing on in March 1996 and has since had rave reviews about its plentiful passing positions, great layout, long straights and the ability to cater for large fields.

Club membership is either single or family and we currently have 53 karters plus family members. To register with the AKA (Australian Karting Association) for a racing licence karters must be a member of a licensed club. There are various classes and types of licence available. More information can be obtained from the Victorian Karting Association website www.vka. asn.au.

Closed race meetings for members are held once a month from February through to November each year. Club days are held on the last Sunday of every month and two open meetings are held as per the Victorian Karting Association calendar. Our open meetings for 2012 are on September 15th and November 17th -18th. Club members travel around the state and interstate throughout the year attending other race meetings.

Cobden held the 2007 Victorian open titles and we have held Victorian closed titles in the past as well. We also regularly hold a round of the Victorian Country Series and in 2012 we are hosting the final round of the series.

The club is continually developing the track facilities and they are now some of the best in the state. In 2011 we opened our new amenities block, which includes toilets and showers, stewards' rooms and a first aid room. This new block is attached to our large clubrooms including bar facilities and a fully equipped kitchen.

These facilities are available for hire to members of the public and over the years many functions have been held there.

Track opening times are Wednesday-Friday 12-5pm. Weekends and public holidays 11am-6pm. Closed Christmas Day and Good Friday. Visitors are most welcome on club days and during the open meetings. There is no charge for spectators.

The Hudgsons owned the next-door Cobden Hotel, which is now the Grand Central Bed and Breakfast.



In 1978, we had 73 senior members and 33 junior members.

Back then, there were fewer sporting options for juniors, and mixed pennant squash was played on Monday and Tuesday evenings, ladies had eight teams of four playing Tuesday mornings and afternoons, and there was racquetball on Fridays. Thursday nights were popular for die-hard (and try-hard) practice.

Many toddlers happily attended the Tuesday sessions with their mums battling it out on court.

Interclub squash was played with Terang, Lismore and Camperdown, and monthly tournaments were held with Warrnambool, Naracoorte, Stawell, Port Fairy, Colac, Hamilton, Camperdown and Casterton clubs.

In the early years, white or light uniform rules were strictly adhered to but a few of us now like to wear more "dark and slimming shades."
