

Characters of Cobden - Bob Andrews

Well-known Cobden identity Bob Andrews was not sure why he had been chosen to feature in the first of our "Characters of Cobden" series. As he said when we visited his Stirling Street home for the interview . . .

"I'M NOT A PUBLICITY MAN"

Anyway, we thought the 83 year-old retired plumber should be recognised for his contribution to his community, particularly for his 65 year involvement with the Cobden Fire Brigade. Bob, who was born and raised in Cobden, still shows great interest in his community.

The eldest of four children, Bob attended Cobden Primary School to Year 8. His father worked with the Shire on the roads. Apart from a short period when his family lived near the racecourse, his home-place has always been in Stirling Street.

Although he was a Cobden Turf Club life-member, he admits to not being a good punter.

In 1946, Bob was invited to join the Cobden Fire Brigade. He soon discovered it was a "good service to the community" and good fun as well. Not only was he captain of the brigade for twelve years, Bob and his competition running team won the B Grade State Fire Brigade Championships in 1981. "My word, we celebrated, long and hard," he laughed.

Bob is a life member of the brigade and, even after 65 years, he still manages to attend meetings and help out around the fire shed.

As a young local bloke, Bob played his fair share of football. He played for ten years at Cobden when they were known as the "Soldier Beetles". He said that ten years was not long enough but, fortunately, he did not sustain any injuries.

In 1948, he played in his first and only premiership with Cobden. He told us there are only two other living members of that team - Peter Rankin and Bernie McQuinn (plus mascots John Murphy and Colin Gaut).

Although football has expanded, Bob still barracks for the North Melbourne Kangaroos. Bob thinks the change from VFL to AFL is great because it is giving more young fellows a chance to play football

When does he think North Melbourne will win another premiership? Probably 2030 because "Geez, when will that happen?" His family has had a long affiliation with the Cobden Football Netball Club as the senior best and fairest award is called the Andrews Cup named after his Uncle Albert Andrews.

After doing many different odd jobs, Bob became a plumber. He chose this job because a position was available and "jobs were scarce in those days." Australia was coming out of a depression.

He is known to be an experienced windmill man, a description which he rejected with "it just happened." When asked if he had any funny stories about windmills, he responded, " 'There is nothing funny about them." He sees windmills as pretty obsolete because there are more efficient ways of getting water to the larger herd sizes.

"Got to keep working" is Bob's advice to young people but he had no words of wisdom for politicians and the local council. His response was, "Not getting involved with that."

Bob is clearly a man who is satisfied with his life. He has seen constant improvements in Cobden with the arrival of the technical school, the airstrip, a bigger and better dairy factory, sporting grounds and other facilities.

He does like the strong community spirit. "All getting together and having a go clearly works for Cobden," he said.

The following excerpts (1840-1995) are taken from **"Building On The Past"** which was researched by Alan Hart and written by Gary Kimber.

Connecting Cobden has added more recent items with the help of principal Peter Lee and business manager Sue Wilson.

Enjoy the trip down memory lane and also see page 3 for reflections from former students, young and old.

Timeline:

- 1840: Dr Daniel Curdie is first white settler in area.
- 1850s: Other settlers arrive. Town known as "Lovely Banks".
- 1865: Town of Cobden proclaimed. First "school" is held at the home of Mr George Braithwaite who is paid by early settlers to teach their children. Braithwaite's son, John, is first Education Department employee to teach at Cobden.
- 1870: After four years of campaigning by local residents, a timber State School is built on same site as today's school. Officially opened on June 14th, with George Braithwaite as head teacher.
- 1872: Eighty people attend the school.

- 1876: Education Dept give permission for a dance at the school, using school band.
- 1877: Cobden defeats Camperdown in "friendly" State School cricket match.
- 1879: Infants' room is erected at a cost of £236. Many children suffer from ringworm.
- 1880: Head teacher Mr C Smithwich is given purse of sovereigns as farewell gift.
 1882: Head teacher Mr C Baker tells Education Dept it is not possible to support him
- 1888: After five years of campaigning for more space, an additional bluestone building is completed at a cost of \$809. Average attendance = 129
- building is completed at a cost of £809. Average attendance 129.
 1890: Thirty children leave after head teacher (Mr Roget) is accused of "unmercifully
- beating a boy with a riding whip." Mr Roget is replaced by Mr W Spring in 1891.
 1897: Head teacher Mr J Corr is appointed the registrar of births and deaths.
- 1900: Health officer condemns school's inadequate roof, windows, floors unfit for occupancy.
- 1902: Cows destroy students' garden. Fence built around the garden is stolen.

Focus on Faith

The Uniting Church in Cobden was formed in 1977, as part of the nation-wide union of three existing churches; Methodist, Presbyterian, and Congregational. A decision was taken to use the existing Methodist building in Curdie Street as our place of worship, and further extensions were built and officially opened in 1981. The prime hilltop property of the old Presbyterian church was subdivided and sold as residential blocks.

Back then there were three outlying parishes; Stoneyford, Cobrico and South Purrumbete; with changing demographics and increasing ability to travel, over the years these churches have all closed.

Cobden Uniting has always been served well by a succession of ministers which have, until 2007, been resident in the town. More recently, seeking ways to staff our churches differently, Cobden has joined the Corangamite Shared

Ministry, and with Camperdown and Derrinallum, share a minister, administrative support, and soon a pastoral care assistant.

Rev Cameron McAdam, who lives in Camperdown, gives us constant encouragement to share our faith within the church, the broader community and beyond, with a strong emphasis on social justice, which is one of the cornerstones of Uniting Church policy.

CHAPLAINCY

As a means of reaching out to our community four years ago Cobden Uniting Church approached the Cobden Technical School to discuss the appointment of a chaplain to the school, and this was duly established, with the church fully funding this position for one day per week.

We were delighted that Rev Malcolm Ward, the pastor at Naringal Baptist Church, accepted this appointment. He is a much respected member of the school's welfare team and offers support, guidance and care to students. Cobden Uniting is very proud of initiating this chaplaincy, and we are delighted that the school appreciates its value and has applied for the new round of Federal funding for chaplaincies, which will be announced shortly.

OPPORTUNITY SHOP

Our Op-shop provides a valuable service to the community, providing low-cost clothing and household items. It also provides food parcels and clothing or goods to people who for any reason find themselves in need.

The shop is managed mainly by the women of the church but also benefits from the generous giving of their time by other local volunteers.

For the last few years proceeds from the Op-shop have helped to support the funding of the school chaplaincy; currently there are conversations taking place about redevelopment of the Op-shop at 50 Curdie Street.

KIDS' PROGRAM

Last year the church initiated a new after-school program; a "Kids' Story Workshop" for primary school children, this has been led by Cobden CRE teacher, Jamie Rothman, and Cameron McAdam. This workshop runs on the last five Tuesday afternoons of each school term, and the children

have great fun with craft, songs, stories and other activities. A wonderful home-cooked afternoon tea is also provided for them.

Cobden Uniting enjoys working with the other Cobden churches at ecumenical occasions, such as the combined service for the Cobden Spring Festival; the last two of these were held under canvas, at the Dairy Park, and wet weather notwithstanding, were most successful.

ADULT FELLOWSHIP

Our womenfolk meet monthly at Uniting Church Adult Fellowship which is not in fact restricted to "Ladies Only", but we are still waiting for our first male members!

As well as responsibilities for the Op-shop, they provide catering for functions at the church, funerals, birthdays etc., and also regularly provide lunch at the Senior Citizens'.

Other activities include guest speakers, fashion days, parish teas, and of course Pancake Day. An excellent afternoon tea is promised; and lots of companionship and chatter.

A new president, Eunice Maskell, has just been elected; Lorraine Oates is secretary and Gwen Mounsey treasurer.

There is also a men's tea held monthly; again a friendly happy occasion; the men bring along food to share, and the chatter may even outdo that of the women! All groups would be delighted to have some new members.

CHURCH COUNCIL

Like all organisations, management is needed in order to function smoothly and we have an elected group of elders, who deal with worship and pastoral care concerns, and the church council which attends to outreach, finances, property maintenance, and all other activities. Jamie Rothman chairs the church council, with Gwenyth Steele as secretary and Barbara Cowley treasurer.

The Cobden Uniting Church lives through the dedication and energy of its members. Church is held every Sunday at 9am, except fifth Sundays when the Corangamite Shared Ministry joins together, usually in Camperdown at 10.30am.

- 1967: Head teacher Mr R Bridges transfers and is replaced by Mr P Bartels in 1968.
- 1969: School fair highlights are minigolf, pony rides, art show and homemade cakes.
- 1970: School's centenary is celebrated

with huge "Back-to". Oldest student returning is Mrs Amy Clarke – nee Spall (86 years-old).

- 1971: Mr Jeff Binder is principal and Marg Tongs begins her Cobden teaching career.
- 1973: With 244 students and ten staff, multi-grades are introduced prep, grades 1 and 2 students in one room.
- 1974: Mr Steve Woodcock begins as principal. Cooperative society formed to provide library books and furniture.
- 1980: Thirty students travel around Victoria on "Train of Knowledge".
- 1983: "Puss in Boots" on stage.
- 1988: Principal is Mr Gary Kimber. School community fights to keep portable room.
- 1989: Headlice presents as a real issue.
- 1990: Five houses to four houses Barrett, Curdie, George and Silvester.

- "Buddies" commences. Sue Wilson starts as business manager.
- 1991: Structured working bees begin.
- 1994: Indonesian introduced as school's Language other than English (LOTE).
- 1996: Assistant principal for six years, Mr David Snell is appointed principal.
- 2004: RSL Hall is purchased.
- 2006: Mr A Dowling begins as principal.
- 2009: Mr Peter Lee is new principal.

brigade in this area, preceding Cobden by several weeks. Brigades were originally known as Bush Fire Brigades but, in 1945, the Government changed the name and they became known as Rural Fire Brigades.

Brigade equipment in the early times consisted of leather-beaters and a

Cobrico Bush Fire Brigade, formed on April 12th 1936, was the first

Brigade equipment in the early times consisted of leather-beaters and a few privately-owned knapsacks. A few years later, when funds became available, a square iron tank was acquired and a semi rotary hand pump and hose was fitted. It had the capacity of 200 gallons (900 litres).

In 1944 a Heytesbury Shire grant of twenty pounds (\$40) and donations from members bought two 150 gallon tanks fitted with low down hand pumps. The following year a government grant of sixty pounds allowed the purchase of two tractor power take off pumps. A tractor was able to tow a trailer and tank and also drive the pump all in the same operation. In later years a 1000 gallon tank and close coupled engine and pump unit was purchased, and a Vintern VHF two way radio was also added some years later.

In 1972 the brigade was issued with an Austin complete truck unit, however due to the absence of a fire station it had to be housed in the shed of a brigade member. This unit was eventually replaced with an updated Austin and then in 1984 the Austin was replaced with a new Hino Diesel 600 gallons.

The current vehicle, also a Hino, came from Bannockburn in 2008 and is housed at the Cobrico Fire Station, which was built in 1979 by voluntary labour for \$1000.

The first office-bearers were captain, Joe Kerr, secretary Bill Andrews, Comms Officer, Mrs Violet Kerr (who was the Cobrico Post Mistress). Membership for each farm was 5 shillings (50¢).

In 2012, 15 of the 20 members are active. Office-bearers complete advanced training while members complete minimum skills training.

The current office-bearers are captain, Philip Downie, secretary, Ken Smith, lieutenants, James Kerr Gavin Mulholland, Louie Cavarsan and Barry Coad. New members are always welcome.

- Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed. (I wonder if marriage was considered unseemly? EW).
- Men teachers were forbidden to appear in public wearing shirt-sleeves unlinked or rolled; hair was to be closely cropped.
- Women were not to be in public in a bathing costume, bloomers for cycling skirts slit to expose ankles or bustle extensions over ten inches.
