68 GREAT GRANDIES, 93 YEARS-OLD **AND PLENTY OF POWER TO ADD!**

Thelma Walsh is well-qualified to say what she

She will be 94 on April 11th, she is the matriarch of a family numbering seven children, 28 grandchildren and 68 great grandchildren, she doesn't drink or smoke, she has won a "town garden of the year" award and she has always considered Cobden "her town".

So what does she think? For a start, she believes Cobden District Health Services deserve more staff. "All this money spent on new year fireworks is a waste. I tell all the visiting health officials the girls here do a wonderful job . . . but they're under-staffed!'

Thelma also believes football is more like basketball now. "They're taking the marking and kicking out of the game, there is less physical stuff, they all chase the ball . . . and they all get too much money.'

"And why do so many people race overseas? There are any amount of nice places to see in Australia!"

Miss Thelma Flaherty grew up on a farm about two and a half miles out of Cobden at Bostocks Creek. The daughter of Campbell and Florrie Flaherty, she attended Bostocks Creek Primary School to grade 8 before taking up full-time milking on the farm. About forty cows had to be milked by hand.

She was the eldest of four daughters – sisters Dora (Beaton), Annie (Eyars) and Joan (Wallace) followed her over a ten year-period. Remarkably, the three Flaherty brothers had four girls each. "All Flaherty girls, no Flaherty boys" was the catch-cry when Joan arrived to complete the team of twelve females."

As the Flaherty name implies, Thelma's grandfather immigrated from Ireland in the

The Walsh family farmed at Bonny Doon at Tandarook but son Dick took up acres on Shenfields Lane (where Jodie and Ben McKenzie are farming) and that's where Dick and Thelma settled after meeting at a Bostocks Creek dance.

The couple married at St Brendan's in 1941. Along came Emily (Russell), Joan (Hammond), Frank, Peter, Kelvin, Gerard and Maria (Courtney) who all kept their parents on their toes as they ventured into their various careers - farming, plumbing, railways, accounting and computing - while raising their own 28 children and 68 grandchildren.

As it stands, Thelma's oldest great grandchild is Jacob Roberts (25) and the youngest is Matthew and Lisa Walsh's Mia (five months) . . . with plenty of power to add!

Against her wishes, husband Dick entered the winning Walsh garden in the local club's competition in 1982. Thelma, who believes she got her love for gardening from her mother, especially appreciates roses and gladioli, no particular colours but preferably older roses because they have a better scent. "At one stage, I had 300 dahlias!" she said proudly.

Since moving into Tandarook Lodge and, now, Lovely Banks, the one thing Thelma misses about her former Cobden home on the corner of Scott and Walker streets is her vegetable garden. "Everyone should have a vegetable garden," she said. "Just being able to pop out and grab what you need for tea is a great thing.'

Sport has played a major role in Thelma's life:

- · Her immediate families played a lot of sport so she was often on milking duties.
- Husband Dick, who died 17 years ago, played in a Cobden reserves premiership in 1931.
- She was a great supporter of the Cobden Junior Football Club with presentation dinners even held at their Shenfields Lane home. Son Frank was coach of the first under 16 premiership team in 1969. He was also runner-up in the Hampden Football League Maskell Cup in 1968.
- · Son Kelvin played in a South Purrumbete premiership team.
- Son Gerard came home from Melbourne for ten years to play cricket and football.
- · While Thelma loves watching football, she



does not barrack for an AFL team - just Cobden in the Hampden league.

- · Football wins every time over cricket (especially "stone-wall" cricket) but she will still watch it if there is nothing else on television.
- She laughs about tarpaulins being hung across trees out at Bostocks Creek so the Ibbs, the Marwoods, the Batemans and the Vaggs could get changed for football.
- Thelma played bowls for 42 years, winning a B grade championship by defeating Norma Coverdale.

Asked to choose one particular highlight from all the family members' considerable sporting achievements, Thelma politely and diplomatically refused. But she did reflect on son Peter's remarkable progress since being struck down by pneumococcal septicaemia in 2006. did not expect him to come home," she said.

Referring to Peter's hand transplant nearly two years ago, "It's marvellous what they can do."

Apart from supporting family members in their pursuits, Thelma has also found time to make slices and sponges for organisations like the hospital committee and bowling club, and she is a life member of the local Catholic Women's League which she joined when it was formed about seventy years ago. She also made vegetable soup for footy club Thursday night teas for fifteen years!

With such a large family, Thelma Walsh is never short of visitors at Lovely Banks but, if there is a spare moment, there are always sports results to catch up on! She is enormously proud of her family and considers rearing her children as being her greatest achievement.

Thelma puts her longevity down to good genes - her grandfather was 90 when he died - and, at nearly 94, she is already the longest-living Flaherty . . . with plenty of power to add!
